MINUTES OF THE 2025 ANNUAL MEETING

Opening Prayer and Introduction

Father Paul opened the annual meeting at 9:18 AM with prayer, and determined a quorum was present. Mark Oliver was appointed as Clerk for the meeting with responsibility to record the meeting minutes.

2024 Annual Parish Meeting Minutes

Father Paul asked for a motion to accept the minutes from last year's Annual Parish Meeting into the record. The minutes were accepted without dissent. Jolayne LaCour put forth a motion to accept, and Jan Rousey seconded. All approved and the motion carried.

Appreciation of Ministry Groups

Father Paul pointed out all the 2024 ministry reports for our edification, and offered thanks to all ministry leaders and members for their work in the past year.

New Vestry Members

Father Paul stated the requirements to serve on the Vestry. Individuals must be at least eighteen years of age, confirmed or received in the Episcopal church, a communicant in good standing with regular church attendance, a giver of financial record, and must adhere to the bylaws of St. David's and the broader Episcopal church.

The nominating committee consisted of Father Paul, Matthew Whitten (Sr. Warden), and outgoing Vestry members Ben Ivey (Treasurer), Karen Smiley, and Mark Oliver (Clerk). Father thanked the outgoing Vestry members for their service and presented parting gifts to them.

Father Paul indicated that three Vestry nominees should be selected to fill open positions. The three individuals with the most votes would be elected to the Vestry for a term of three years (2024-2026). Vestry vote results were as follows:

Marc DeWitt (59), Jolayne LaCour (50), Erica Redgraves (50), with Dustin Thurmond (49) as alternate.

Delegates to Diocesan Convention

A vote was taken for delegates to Diocesan Convention with four seats available.

Diocesan Convention results were as follows:

Step Aument, Jesse Davis, Beverly Ivey, and Jolayne LaCour were elected as delegates, with Dave Mays as alternate.

Building Report – Jesse Davis

Jesse reported that our new church was the first big project like this since the 1980's and probably the most challenging since the original church was built. All told, it is about a \$7MM project when everything is accounted for. We borrowed approximately \$3.6MM, with parishioners and the Diocese making up the balance. Jesse thanked the Vestry for their courage and leadership to cast this vision and move it forward. He thanked each donor and commented that everyone has been part of this project. Special recognition to donors that pledged for three years, starting 5 years ago and continuing donations after the three years, was offered up. While there was a slight cash shortage toward the end of the project, numerous donors helped cover the costs during that time. The building project received a 12-month loan from St. David's Endowment Fund at market rate, and it was paid back within four months. Father Paul thanked Jesse for his time and commitment, vision, and leadership, going above and beyond.

Endowment Committee Report – Dick Wells

Dick mentioned the Endowment message in the prayer books and hymnals about end-of-life giving, and invited parishioners to ensure their legacy includes St. David's. He thanked Ben Ivey for his assistance with the building loan. Dick spoke about buildings having a soul and reminded us that we must continue St. David of Wales so that all future parishioners can feel the presence of all that have worshiped there before them.

Treasurer's Report – Ben Ivey

Ben recognized the financial challenge from the last year and commented that the parish came through. He outlined our planned \$525,000 operating budget for 2025 and noted that received pledges and expected income would help us reach that goal. He informed us that the property insurance was rolled over into the building loan. Also of note; there was a new A/C unit installed for the older church building in 2024, staff salaries would increase for 2025. Outreach funding would also increase.

Junior Warden's Report – Linda Chamberlain

Linda made a joke about being in places in the church she did not know existed. She offered thanks to everyone that helped and encouraged her over the last year. She noted that while performing a church inventory, she experienced a wonderful connection to our past. She named her gratitude for the opportunity to serve St. David's.

Senior Warden's Report – Matthew Whitten

Matthew thanked Father Paul for his leadership. He reminded us that any parishioner can come to a Vestry meeting, and that we are extraordinarily blessed by Father Paul. Being inspired by what Dick Wells said, he noted that we have an extraordinary opportunity now to do the Great Commission, to bring the Word to all, and make disciples of all. He commented that our Outreach budget is a priority, and that the Vestry is committed to smart stewardship of parish funds.

Rector's Report – Father Paul Nesta

Father Paul discussed how we start by shaping our buildings, and soon our buildings begin to shape us. He noted that our average Sunday attendance (ASA) was 173 from Jan-July, then in new building it rose to 191 people. There was a 50% increase in attendance for midnight mass; the highest we have had in 25 years. Projections were that ASA would increase to over two hundred in the coming year. He spoke about our ambitions pledge drive for 2025, increased to \$525K. He shared that two families have committed to donate a new altar window that should be installed by year-end. He spoke about St. David's "riding a wave" that is not of our own making, and that we have responding to the call of God. We are now able to move a bit more slowly and deliberately, to make followers of Jesus. He noted that he will work with our Outreach Committee and Vestry to determine the path forward in the coming years. He encouraged us to commit to daily prayer, the Daily Office, and regularly receiving the Eucharist. He was grateful for our staff and offered thanks, again, to all ministry Chairpersons. He offered special thanks to Marc DeWitt for spending so much time working on our acoustics in the new church over the past year.

Admission of New Vestry Members

New Vestry members were presented, examined, and admitted to their new roles: Erica, Jolayne, and Marc.

Dismissal

Father Paul offered a final blessing to the parish and the Annual Meeting adjourned at 10:26 AM.

RECTOR'S REPORT

The following offers highlights from Fr. Nesta's Report at our Annual Meeting.

Two years ago, Bishop Price, the then Dean of St. Matthew's Cathedral in Dallas, joined us on St. David's Day to lay and bless the foundation stone for our new building. After the service, Dean Price pulled me aside and said that he could palpably sense God's Spirit at work in our congregation. "St. David's is really punching above its weight class, not just with this building project, but across the board," he told me. If "punching above our weight class" describes St. David's in recent years, then 2025 was the beginning of a new season, a season of St. David's coming into its own.

Worship + Discipleship

Our average attendance grew by 17% last year from 180 to 210 in-person worshippers each Sunday. That's up 22% since our first Sunday in our new church and it is the first full year we have been over 200 since the 1980's. Those percentage numbers are more than a statistic. Each person who has joined us brings with them a story of faith and are here to take the next step in their discipleship journey. Fourteen adults were confirmed or received into the Episcopal Church last year, and over two dozen youth and adults will be confirmed and received this May. One hundred and seventy-three (173) adults, youth, and children participated in some form of Christian education at St. David's last in 2025. That means that most people who worship with us each week also deepen their faith through opportunities like Sunday School or a small group. There is a thickness to our community and a depth of relationship that is formed here, both our relationship with God and our

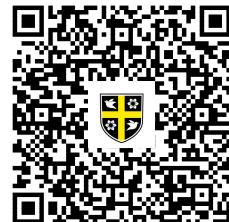


relationships with one another. St. David's is not just a church that is growing, but a community of people who themselves are growing as disciples of Jesus.

Five hundred and forty-four liturgies took place here at St. David's last year. Most of those liturgies occurred right here in our Chapel as a handful of parishioners gather Monday-Friday for Morning Prayer and Holy Communion. For some who attend, it's their first experience St. David's. Others drive up to 45 minutes to be at a midweek service because their church does not offer midweek liturgies. Still others are faithful parishioners of our congregation whose schedules do not allow them to worship with us on Sundays. In addition to praying Morning Prayer and celebrating Mass each weekday, we've seen marriage vows renewed, adults baptized, confessions heard, and individuals anointed—all before 9:00 am on a Monday morning!

Witness

The most significant way that we came into our own in 2025 had nothing to do with the numerical or financial growth our parish saw last year. A mark of maturity for a congregation and for an individual is how well they look beyond themselves. "Each of you should look not only to your own needs, but also to the needs of others" St. Paul tells the Philippians (2:4). Thanks to our Outreach Committee's discernment and your overwhelming support, we launched our DovePax ministry in October to assist food insecure families in our local neighborhood. This coming year we will expand into additional elementary school and work to develop partnerships with local organizations who can join in this mercy ministry with us.

2026: A Year of Celebration and Renewed Vision

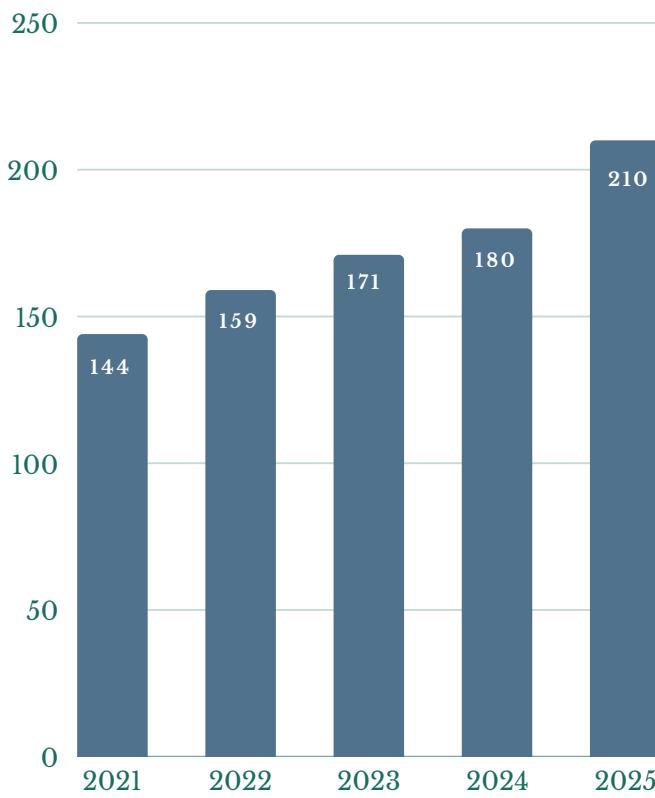

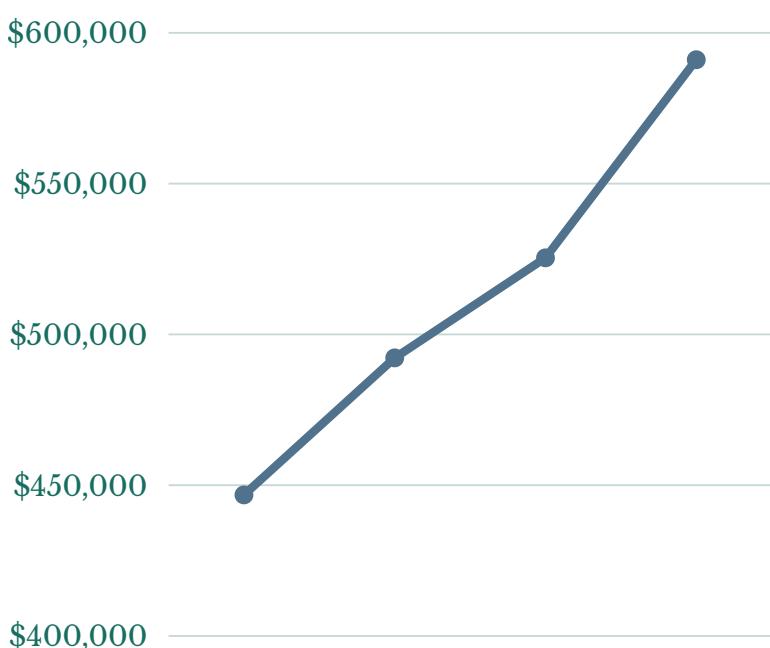


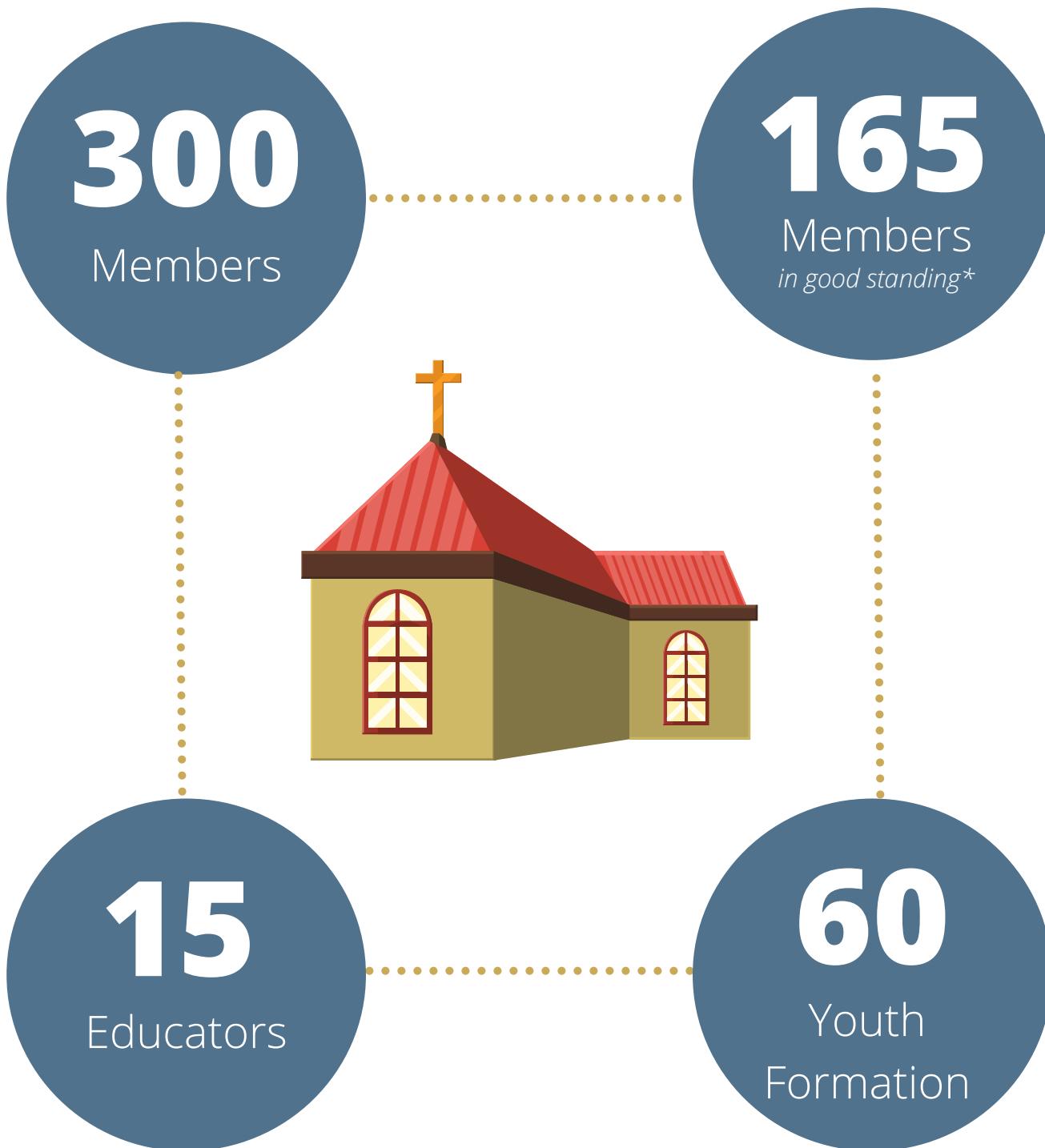

SENIOR WARDEN'S REPORT

What is the Vestry? It's a fair question. The Episcopal Church uses unique language to describe itself, and it's only after five years of serving that I think I can answer. I aim to do so here, but my true aim is to encourage you to consider finding out for yourself.

I could give the cold definition: The Vestry is an elected body that, under the leadership of the Rector, meets monthly to prayerfully steward the temporal resources and guide the mission of the parish. But the cold definition lacks warmth without concrete examples. It can't really answer what it is like to serve on the Vestry. I think a better question is, "What does a good Vestry do?"

One of a Vestry's primary roles is to uphold our financial integrity and maintain our property. To that end, last year much of the Vestry's business was oversight of finances, approval of small changes to the property like the gates on the driveway and improvements to the youth room, and management of larger projects like repairs to the education building. This Senior Warden even managed to change some lightbulbs and set out a few sandbags. And as a church grows as St. David's does, it becomes necessary to undertake the mundane like revision of operating policies for ministry funds. The Vestry set about these tasks efficiently and without complaint.

The Vestry – particularly the Senior Warden – plays another critical role by supporting the Rector. During Father Paul's sabbatical, the Vestry ensured that the day-to-day business of running the parish continued. Myself, Junior Warden Linda Chamberlain, and Treasurer Marc DeWitt spoke almost daily. I would like to thank Linda and Marc for their flexibility during that time. Recent improvements around St. David's are largely the fruit of their work. For a Senior Warden, perhaps the most consistent role is acting as a sounding board for the Rector, who I can vouch works tirelessly for the benefit of this parish and its people.

Most importantly, the fundamental role of every vestryperson is commitment to serve the parish. Like others who have served, I've grown accustomed to being approached by parishioners with questions and concerns ranging from ordinary ("Have you noticed that broken sprinkler near the flower bed?) to exciting ("Here's an idea – DovePax!"). I've cherished fielding your concerns and hearing your ideas. You who have come to me with church business have learned by now that you're not signing up for a quick answer but an extended conversation about life and whatever is on your mind. It has been the best part of serving, and I can gratefully observe that from these connections I have gained more than I have sacrificed in my time as Senior Warden.

I hope these examples have kindled some warmth on a cold definition. I hope that you'll consider serving on the Vestry yourself someday. You too will gain more than you sacrifice.



JUNIOR WARDEN'S REPORT

It has been a privilege to serve as your Junior Warden this past year. My primary responsibility has been overseeing the care and maintenance of our church buildings and grounds to ensure our facilities support the church's mission.

In addition to focusing on the numerous essential and general building and grounds maintenance needs, which have grown as our facilities have grown, we had several major improvement projects completed this year.

- Roofing, siding, guttering and interior repairs of the education wing
- Repaired ruts in the south parking lot caused by unauthorized heavy equipment vehicular traffic
- Installed gates to prevent said unauthorized usage and further parking lot damage during the week.
- Flooding of the parish office was caused by unusually heavy rains in June. Drainage modifications were made to the curbs in front of the office to prevent future flooding.
- Youth room and parlor relocations and improvements were made.
- Added manual drains to both the inflow and outflow pipes of the backflow prevention setup of the sprinkler system to make winterization of the system more efficient and effective.
- Completely revised and updated a manual with pertinent information for future Junior Wardens

I extend my sincere gratitude to the church members, Rector, Vestry members, volunteers, and staff for their support this year. The collaborative effort of everyone helps ensure that our facilities continue to serve the mission of the church effectively for many years to come.

TREASURER'S REPORT

2025 was a year to behold at St David's, marking our first Christmastide in the new church that started our first winter and Lent, then Easter with spring in-tow, and lastly our first Pentecost season with summer riding on its heels. 2024 left us with a long list of "known unknowns", and these unknowns did lead to a few challenges with the church's finances through the year; however, we weathered the ups and downs of the period, and landed in a place to celebrate.

While the "known unknowns" led to amendments in the budget that showed a \$10,649 shortfall, and similar factors led us to running over-budget by about \$6,000 in expenses, your generosity and the stewardship of the church's leadership kept the deficit to a manageable \$8,994-\$1,654 better than budgeted. Given that our operating cash accounts sit \$18,000 higher than the beginning of the year, St. David's withstood both the known and unknowns of the year thanks to your bountiful contributions and a faithfully accommodating staff.

We enter 2026 with a budget just shy of \$600,000 that's fully balanced, and takes into account the real values of the "known unknowns" in 2025. It's an increase in-line with increases of the past 4 years, atop being on the heels of our first-ever half-million dollar year. Through your benevolence, the budget balances to the penny, and I'm certain we'll celebrate 2026 the same as we celebrate 2025 today.

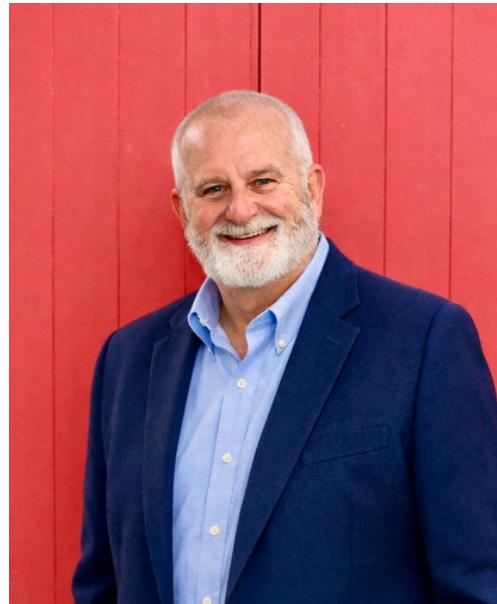
OUTREACH COMMITTEE

At the beginning of 2025, the Outreach Committee, with the assistance of the Vestry, began the process of discerning a new focus for our social witness in Denton. We also asked for your input in a survey that we made available in our weekly e-news and Sunday announcements. Responses overwhelmingly indicated that care for needy families with children and care for the hungry were top priorities for our parish.

We interviewed more than a dozen teachers, clergy, counselors, doctors, first responders, and city officials. Almost every community leader we interviewed mentioned the void that Love Packs left when it shut down its operation in Denton at the end of May 2025.

As a result of these activities, we formed a program called Dove Pax that will serve to bridge the gap in food security for families in our neighborhood during extended school breaks. In 2025, Dove Pax distributed 198 food packs to Newton Rayzor Elementary School and Calhoun Middle School for the Thanksgiving and Christmas holidays. The goal is to expand to other schools in 2026 and establish community partnerships to further promote Dove Pax throughout Denton.

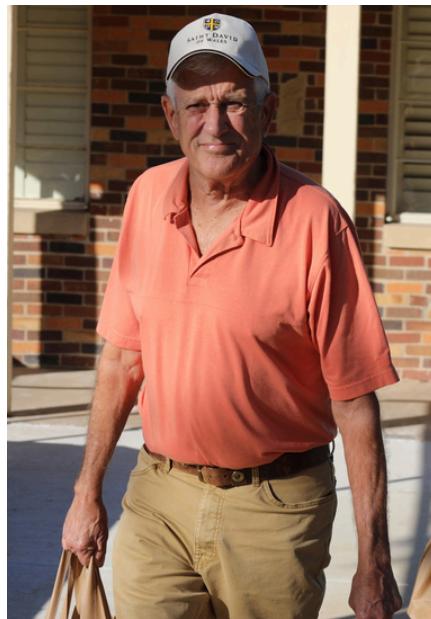
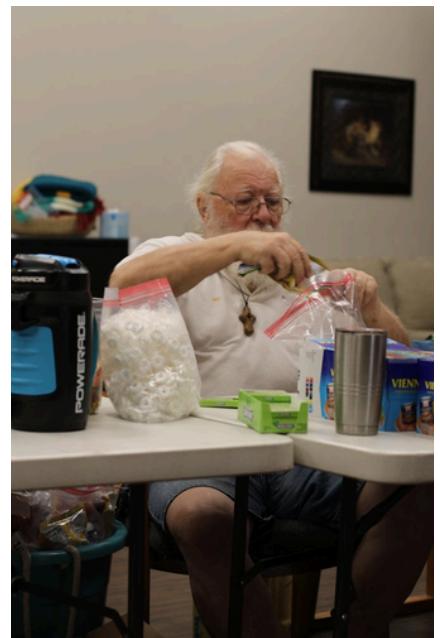
In other Outreach activities, St. David's has distributed Snack Packs to those experiencing homelessness on Sundays after our 10:30 am service. This year, we handed out our 20,000th snack pack! We also support The Kellermann Foundation by providing tuition for nursing students in Uganda each year. In recent years, we have supported Nashotah House Theological Seminary in their effort to train orthodox ordinands in the Anglo-Catholic tradition. Also, in 2025, there was a one-time donation to Gateway of Grace to assist with an urgent need for refugee resettlement.

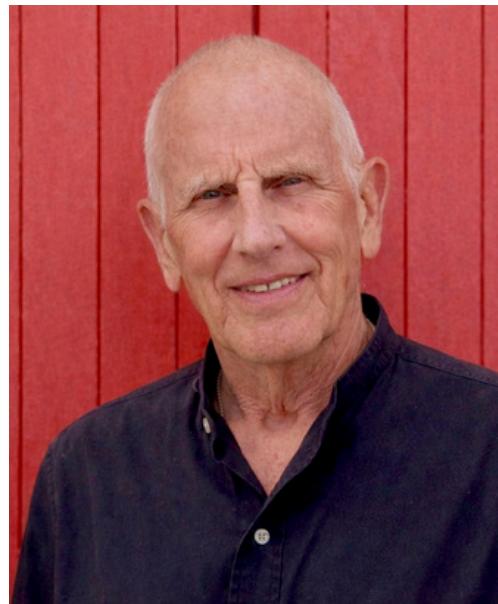
ENDOWMENT FUND

The purpose of our Endowment Fund is to help strengthen the future of Saint David's through planned end-of-life giving. Endowment Fund assets usually come from our bequests (i.e., to Saint David's in a will or trust) of cash, securities or real estate. These gifts are typically from assets accumulated over the donor's lifetime. However, some of these gifts, for instance by having a trust, can continue to provide income to the giver during their lifetime, after which, the specific asset will pass to Saint David's.

In turn, our Parish Endowment Fund financially supports Saint David's. For example, the Endowment Fund purchased new prayer books and hymnals to use in our new building.

Additionally, the Endowment Fund Committee loaned the Saint David's Building Fund money to help complete the new building and all the furnishings. That loan was fully repaid to the Fund by the end of 2024. The Endowment Fund continues supporting our Parish in that way.

The Saint David of Wales Legacy Society is a way to recognize those among us who commit to making a planned gift to Saint David's and to share in the joy of Christian giving. Some parishioners may believe that they are not wealthy enough to make an end-of-life gift to Saint David's. Or, they do not know how much will be in their estate and do not feel comfortable setting a specific dollar amount. There is no minimum required. No gift is too small. Also, to avoid the worry of determining an exact dollar amount, a percentage of your estate, a 10% tithe for example, can be gifted. There is no requirement of proof to be a member of the Legacy Society. All a parishioner needs to do is make known their intention of making such a bequest to Saint David's. Just tell Fr. Paul or one of us on the Endowment Committee (Ben Ivey, Robert Chafin, Dick Wells or Jan Rousey).

Legacy gifts to our Endowment Fund are a way we can say that we believe our Parish should continue to be an expression of what has been meaningful in our lives and as our blessing upon future generations. It is a way for us to ensure that Saint David's of Denton can carry on; as said in Psalm 78, "... we will tell to the coming generation the glorious deeds of the Lord and his might, and the wonders that he has done."

The Book of Common Prayer tells us that it is our Christian duty to make prudent provision for the well-being of our families by arranging for the disposal of our worldly goods. So, each of us should (1.) have a will, and (2.) not neglect, if able, to leave bequests for religious uses. Remember, our Parish family is perhaps the most visible part of "...the blessed company of all faithful people" for many of us.

BUILDING COMMITTEE

Wait a minute, a report from the Building Committee? Isn't the new church finished? For that matter, why do we call them "buildings" when they are already built?! Well, our new worship space is certainly *built*, but our *Building* work is far from finished.

We've been in the new building for over a year now. We've celebrated Easter, two beautiful Christmases, baptisms, funerals, confirmations, the dedication mass, and more than a year's worth of feasts, festivals, and Sunday Eucharists under its roof. Throughout 2025, we received several additional adornments and liturgical items. Already in 2026, through the generosity of donors, we have received and blessed wonderful new candlesticks, an altar cross, and a processional cross custom made for this new worship space. In Eastertide, also through the generosity of donors, we expect to install a magnificent new stained glass window above the altar.

Certainly our new church is a beautiful testament to the Glory of God and the work the Holy Spirit is doing at St. David's. But just as certainly, our work is not finished. Just like a new house, the new building has had a few unexpected maintenance or repair items (almost all of which were covered by warranty). We are in regular communication with Fr. Paul and the Vestry about the building and its use now and into the future.

The Building Committee's work primarily continues because of our ongoing financial obligations. Many of you have continued making payments to the Building Fund over and above your original pledge amounts. This is especially helpful as we make our monthly payments toward the construction loan with Great Plains Bank. This loan matures in July 2027. So, in 2026 we will conduct a capital campaign in preparation for refinancing into a longer-term loan. Not just to raise money for the mortgage, but also to engage the many new families who have joined St. David's since the groundbreaking. And, along the way, to provide a few things that were just out of reach in our pre-construction budgets. For example, a successful capital campaign might enable us to build a new playground, or install flooring over the concrete in the Sacristy and Vestry. Of course you can also expect new memorial and dedication opportunities.

As expected, the new building has proven to be a wonderful instrument for ministry, worship, and growth at St. David's. We offer our sincere thanks for your steadfast support in making it a reality, and we ask you to prayerfully consider what continued support might look like for your family into the future.



MUSIC AND CHOIR

2025 was another remarkable year for our choir. In addition to providing music every Sunday (except for the month of July), the choir presented music for our annual Lessons and Carols service on December 14, our joint Epiphany service with St. Barnabas, the Feast of the Presentation, the Feast of the Holy Cross, and Evensong for St. David's Day. It was also our first Holy Week in our beautiful new nave, a space that continues to inspire and excite us.

2026 is going to be a fabulous year for the choir. In addition to the Epiphany service on January 6, we will present music for other special services, including the Feast of the Presentation on February 1, and St. David's Day on March 1.

May is going to be an especially exciting month with the dedication of the new window on May 31 and Evensong on Sunday, May 3, to celebrate my 50 years as your organist and choir director at St. David's. Although the math is correct, it is still hard for me to comprehend how much time has passed! And in September we will celebrate the 75th anniversary of our parish!

One of the greatest joys of my life is making music with other people. We have recently added several new choir members and are always ready to welcome more! We rehearse every Wednesday from 6 to 7 pm in the Parish Hall.

I am always grateful that God called me to serve in this place, and I am beyond excited at how far we have come! I deeply appreciate Father Paul's support and vision for music at St. David's, and he is an absolute joy to work with! To Father Paul, my fellow staff members, the Vestry and the entire congregation, I extend my deepest thanks for all that you do to support the musical life of the parish. And to all of our wonderful choir members, thank you for making music with me week after week.

CHILDREN & FAMILY MINISTRIES

Our Children, Youth, and Family Ministries exist to support our youngest parishioners from birth through high school, and their families to know, love, and follow Jesus.

In 2025, this ministry continued to grow in participation and attendance, and I have seen our young people and their families becoming more engaged in the life of our parish. We built a reliable team of nursery staff and formation volunteers who help make our Sunday mornings flourish.

Our middle and high school ministry, the Youth of Saint David's (YOSD), gathered twice a month following the 10:30 service for fellowship and scripture. We began the year working through hymns and worship songs that have spoken to our hearts and how they connect with the Bible. And ended the year with a series titled "One of a Kind" about being created in God's image. Special events this year included our end-of-school celebration at Andy B's, a youth vs. staff kickball game and tailgate, and a festive Christmas party at Slick City. Two of our youth and one parent joined the diocesan youth mission trip to North Carolina to support hurricane relief efforts.



On Sunday mornings during the school year, formation continued to anchor our ministry. Godly Play invited children ages 4–8 into imaginative encounters with scripture, while those ages 9–11 explored lectionary lessons that connected directly with worship. Youth in grades 6–12 worked through an overview of the Old Testament using Bible Project videos and discussion. During the 10:30 a.m. service, Rite-K offered a developmentally appropriate children's church experience that helped our younger members engage more deeply in the Eucharist. Nursery care remained available throughout Sunday mornings and during Wednesday choir rehearsals, supported by a capable and caring team. This year, the team also provided a lectionary-based Bible story for the children in the nursery during the 8 am service.

The year was also rich with intergenerational events that drew our parish family together: the Epiphany Pageant, VBS's "True North" Alaskan adventure, Back-to-School Blessing, All Saints' Day procession, St. David's Day celebration, Lenten Family Day, Easter Egg Hunt, Fall Festival and Chili Cookoff, Advent Family Day with St. Nicholas, and our Christmas Parents' Night Out. Each of these moments reminded us that formation is not only taught but lived together. I am deeply grateful for the volunteers, chaperones, nursery workers, and parents who make these and all our events possible.

Looking ahead, my hope for 2026 is to deepen formation for all ages, see our youth continue to build meaningful relationships together as they grow in their walks with Jesus, strengthen our volunteers, and support parents and caregivers in their vital work of discipleship at home.

Serving as your Director of Children and Family Ministries continues to be a blessing. I cannot wait to see how God leads our children, youth, and families in the year to come.



COMMUNICATIONS & CONNECTIONS

St. David's maintains a robust communication strategy that combines digital and traditional channels to keep our congregation informed, engaged, and spiritually nourished while extending a welcoming invitation to newcomers. Our program is anchored by four components:

- **Livestream services** make worship accessible to everyone, regardless of location or circumstances. Whether someone is homebound, traveling, ill, or simply exploring faith from afar, they can participate in real time or watch recordings later. This removes physical barriers, allowing people to experience the church's teaching, music, and community remotely, which often becomes a first step toward deeper involvement.
- **Photography** captures authentic moments of church life—smiling faces during fellowship, baptisms, small group gatherings, outreach events, and everyday interactions. High-quality images shared across platforms (website, social media, and the Shield) tell visual stories of our vibrant community.
- **Printed bulletins** serve as a tangible guide for in-person attendees each Sunday. They outline the order of service, share announcements, and highlight important moments in parishioners' lives, like birthdays and anniversaries. For visitors, the bulletin offers an immediate sense of belonging and clarity about what's happening, helping them follow along and feel included.
- Our **weekly newsletter**, the Shield, delivers timely updates beyond Sunday mornings. This ongoing touchpoint keeps our community connected throughout the week, and provides important information about what's coming up next.

MINISTRY REPORTS

Acolytes

Young people in this age range sometimes find serving God in his Church difficult, and the acolyte ministry can be an accessible way for kids to participate. The acolyte ministry answers a real need by assisting the priest at the altar. Our Acolyte Corp is made up of boys and girls ages 10 through high school graduation. Acolytes are scheduled one Sunday service per month, with Senior Acolytes forming a fifth Sunday team four times per year. We recognize many of our youth are active in school and community events. If a scheduled Sunday service conflicts with another activity, our non-scheduled acolytes and crucifers are always available to stand in.

Altar Guild

The Altar Guild ministry is dedicated to preparing and maintaining the altar, vestments, vessels, and linens for worship. The Altar Guild works closely with our clergy to ensure the altar is prepared and ready for observing a holy and reverent worship liturgy.

In 2025, the Altar Guild worked with Fr. Nesta to enact liturgical change designed to enhance worship in our new church. He led us faithfully and patiently through each new design.

The Altar Guild is always looking for new team members. The ministry offers a way for us to be directly involved in the liturgy. We experience rich fellowship in our work as we grow together in our faith. If you would like to find a new way to serve God and His church, we would love to welcome you into our ministry.

Daughters of the King

The Order of the Daughters of the King® is an order of women who are communicants of the Episcopal Church and churches in communion with it. We have 39 members who have gone through a three-month period of study and discernment. The Service Spotlight welcomed our Senior Daughters to spend time engaging the Juniors in presentations and discussions about how they serve God, highlighting which service work they render to others at church, within the community and globally.

We are a network of individual believers, clergy and lay, who come together in local and online Healing Communities to pray and to learn more about God's healing love and the power of the Holy Spirit to transform lives and bring wholeness.

The OSL offers Healing Prayers in the church in front of the eagle lectern every Sunday after both the 8:00 and 10:30 Mass. In addition, we have visited a non-parishioner for healing prayers at the request of a parishioner, and with the Rector's approval.

Prayers are offered for both physical and inner healing as well as intercessory prayers as requested.
